As our numbers are so few we now meet in my house every 2 weeks, but we are on our Winter break and will start again at the end of February to work on our Easter programme.

Due to various personnel issues and problems we have been unable to perform as a proper MVP 'choir'. However we were really keen to be involved, as usual, in a programme of singing in our local Care Homes, where we were requested to lay on a Carol Service. As I reported in Issue 24 of Choirlink, our membership is very small at the moment, with just 1 member for each part, together with our Leader and Accompanist, Dr David Tingley, who has renamed us, unofficially, as the 'Cheltenham Male Voice Praise Singers'. We sang in unison with the help of the staff and residents. I produced a generic pro-

gramme which we used in all 6 Homes, and instead of having a short epilogue-style Christmas message, the Chairman gave a mixture of a brief introduction or description of the carol, together with a suitable Bible passage to accompany. We give thanks to the Lord for His divine enabling on each occasion and the Activity Coordinators for each engagement were very complimentary and have asked us to visit again during the year, using a similar format. It was wonderful to be able to serve the Lord as a 'choir of sorts'. It was really great to renew fellowship with one of our residences, to which we have not been invited since pre-pandemic time and we have been invited to return sometime during the year, DV.

We were all set to perform our Christmas programme with two 2nd basses, when David H took a mild heart attack and was advised by his Consultant that he should step down from his numerous Christian commitments and live life at a slower pace. He was thus unable to join us in our singing.

Please again pray for us, a choir of older men who love singing and speaking for the Lord, that in His goodness He will continue to sustain us and lead others to join us in our ministry for Him.

Greetings from Exeter. As we have been very remiss in not sending reports recently you may be forgiven for thinking the choir had closed. It is true that some while ago we were very small, some of our members had passed away, and we had lost members through frailty and illness. We prayed over the situation and decided that we would continue if the Lord provided new choirmen and venues. The Lord answered our prayers, and we have had a very balanced choir of 16 choirmen and have been invited to sing at several new venues.

We started the last quarter with an engagement at a new venue at Poundsgate Methodist Church. This little Chapel is on Dartmoor with very few houses around and has just one service a month. We wondered what size congregation we would have, but were delighted to see that the church was full, with the congregation responding well to the music and message we sang.

In October we were invited to lead a Harvest Festival service in a small Chapel in mid Devon. We had invited the retired evangelical Bishop of Plymouth to be our chairman and speaker. Although the Chapel was quite small the numbers attending were such that not everyone was able to get into the building. We were not sure whether they came to hear the Bishop or the choir! We have been invited back next year, but next time to a larger building!

Perhaps we have been most surprised by the size of the congregations at our engagements as we had not visited 3 of the venues before. One of these was St. George's, the parish church at Goodrington, Paignton. It was one of those days when we wondered whether we would need to cancel the engagement because of the atrocious weather. My, didn't it rain! We were perhaps expecting no more than 25 to come out and hear us, but were most pleasantly surprised to see about 70 in the congregation. Although most were not used to hearing the FMVP style of singing, again there was a positive response to the presentation of the gospel.

Our final engagement of the year was at a Gospel Hall in Torquaythe home church of one of our own choirmen. Once more, there was a good turnout, and we were pleased to be able to sing both the old carols, and many of the newer ones written by Valerie Collison.

You will realise from this report that we have been very encouraged over the last three months in being able to sing for our Lord and to witness for Him. However, we have also had our challenges, and we finished the year with having funerals for two of our choirmen who had been called home. We also have sickness in the choir. and we are looking to the Lord again for his guidance for 2025. We wish to sing the gospel as long as we are able, and so your prayers for us will be much appreciated thank you.

The St. Ives MVP Choir make up a large part of the tenor and bass section so it is difficult to fit our own engagements within the busy timetable. However, the object remains: to present the Gospel in song.
